Model 12's could well be preview of "big" races in Perth, Australia - February 1987

While the big races are headed "down under" during the cold wintery months in Newport the Mini-America's Cup will be detending its 1983 victory in September of

Obviously, when it's cold here, it's warm in Perth Australia, where the full size cup races will take place during the first weeks of February 1987.

The strongest contingent ever of M.S. skippers will assemble for 3 hectic days of racing to determine who will defend the cup for the U.S. Of the 15 skippers on hand, James "Buddy" Black of St. Petersburg, Fl. and Manny Costa of Cumberland, Ri, have to be rated the two top contenders. However, results over the past 2 years indicate that their job will be no sail-away with easy victories, as any one of the remaining skippers can jump to the forefront unexpectedly.

in the "challenger" department John Cleave of England will return to try to recapture the "CUP" he won in 1980 and relinquished in 1983. John's loss in 1983. was by less than 24" in the 7th and final race of the series

A newcomer, by the name of Gerhard Kelter Jr. from Stockholm, Sweden, will be on hand to challenge John for challenger nghts Rounding out the challenger he a will be Rich Whan of Ottowa Canada.

MINI-AMERICA'S CUP REPRESENTATIVE TO GO TO PERTH


The Mini-America's Cup winner, or highest ranked skipper in sequence, will have the opportunity to go to Perth. Austraffa during the full-size cup races to challenge the best of Australia. What might be dubbed the "Mint Australia Cup" will take place during that visit. Australian arrangements are being handled by athe Western Australia Model Yacht Assn. of Australia. Details will be announced at Newport in September 1988.

History

The Mini-America's Cup program got its start in September of 1974, when the Hobby Industry of America launched a "news film," using model boats to duplicate the world's most famous sailboat race the America's Cup.

Preparation began in the spring of 1974 to organize the program and find two of the USA's top skippers. They would then race a best 4 out of 7 on a course similar to the full size boats. In cooperation with the Newport Intl. Sailboat Show, which annually took place at Fort Adams, the event was staged in front a large enthusiastic crowd.

Ironically the two skippers selected for the film turned out to be brothers, who had not seen each other for several years. James "Buddy" and Charles "Chuck" Black dueled feverishly to the delight of the excited crowd, and "no acting was necessary to make this film full of real life action" and lots of intensity. From this beginning, interest was aroused to broaden the program to include foreign challengers and more closely duplicate the real race series. By 1977 a full-scale Mini-America's Cup event was underway.

To sharpen U.S. skippers skills, annual series take place, called "Mini-America's Cup U.S. Trials." These programs are rotated to various parts of the country They help foster the interest and broaden the number of skippers who would become avid participants. In 1975 Buddy Black recorded the first MAC U.S. trial championship. He duplicated it again in 1976

When 1977 rolled around Mr Black was unable to attend, opening the field to many new hopefuls Bob Harris, who had previously come close to challenging Mr. Black moved to the forefront He bested a field of U.S. skippers "to defend" for the U.S. against John Cleave of England. His expertise earned him the MAC championship U.S. trials were resumed in Florida during 1979. Chartle Lafor rose to prominence by winning that event

In 1978 Carter Cain of Hilton Head, SC. along with Chris Jensen of Itasca, IL



dueled feverishly for 4 days with Carter winning the U.S. title in a best of 7 elimination series Unfortunately, Charlie Lalor was unable to attend because of illness. and the untimely death of Bob Harris took his name off the state.

A twist in the cup series came about when John Cleave of England won the 1980 event He elected to "defend" in Newport come 1983, so as to be part of the excitement of the real America's Gup races During the 1981 and 1982, the U.S. Mini-Cup Trials became a serious tune-up for recapturing the cup. To further broaden the model boat activity, the Newport Mayor's Cup Regatta was established The Narragansett Model Yacht Club hosted several events and was a major factor in contributing to the development of this program.

The U.S. Trials took place in 1982 at the world famous Florida theme park ... SEA WORLD of Orlando, Carter Cain again took the title, closely edging Charlie Lalor,

1983 proved to be a storybook program packed with excitement James "Buddy" Black returned to the scene of his first victory, and convincingly beat out 14 U.S. skippers to be named the U.S. team representative. He then bested the other foreign challengers to become the official CHAL-LENGER against John Cleave DEFENDER Mr. Black's first three victories implied it would be an easy route. However, John Cleave stormed back to tie at 3 all forcing a 7th and final showdown race. A large crowd stood in utter silence, as Buddy Black eked out the finish line, with Mr. Cleave following by less than 24

Although the big cup made history when the U.S. lost and the defense was moved to Perth. Australia, the U.S. MAC team voted strongly to "defend" the Mini-Cup in Newport, during September of

The MAC event proudly boasts its presence in Newport as the "only Mini-America's Cup event for 1986 in the City of Newport" This race series could well be a preview of the U.S. attempt to recapture the cup at Perth, Australia in February

Editorial Comments

All aspects of model sailboating are quite similar to the art of sailing full-size boats. That is to say, the actual art of sailing, use of the wind, tacking, and sailing rules are all the same. However, there is one difference. When you are on a real boat, you physically handle the boat while you are on it Small decisions in handling the wheel or tiller can easily be corrected with no reflex problems.

Whereas with the model boats, you have to rely on eyesight, as you stand on the shoreline with your transmitter, which is controlled by the tip of your thumb or forefinger, when sending a signal to the boat. Thus, when the tension mounts, a very minute push on the controls in the wrong direction, can instantly sail your boat in the wrong direction, or into your opponents

As the tension continues to mount all of one's nervous system becomes bottled up in that very small segment of the control

There is no room for even a fraction of wrong steering and your mind must be equally astute in being "tuned in" to the job at hand

East Coast 12-Meter. One-Design Model

The East Coast 12-Meter yacht model was born as a towing tank testing model prior to the 1967 America's Cup defense. The hull is a variation on COLUMBIA with modifications by designer Charles Morgan. Though the actual vessel was never built from that tank model. Mr. Morgan went on to design, test and campaign a later vessel, HERITAGE, in the 1970 Cup trials.

James "Buddy" Black, of Yampa, obtained the tank model of the COLUMBIA variant and utilized it as a plug to make a liberglass mold. In the late 60's he produced a number of hulls for use as radio controlled models. At the present time, the East Coast 12 is the only sanctioned class in the AMYA which is based on a full sized vessel. The sail plan and jib have been arranged to retain the grace and majesty of the big 12's, and even though a racing machine, the EC-12 projects a fine scale appearance for the modeler who desires it.

As raced under AMYA sanction, the EC-12

Class is controlled by a set of one-design specifications. These measurements are the results of years of experience and experimentation with the vessel, and when adhered to produce a fast, easily-handled vessel

Sail area includes: fuff, leach, foot and roach Dimensions are specified for main and jib Sail material: dacron or mylar No spinnakers allowed

Booms/masts: must be straight material wood aluminum or fiberglass

One of model sailings most notable skippers since 1963 when he was commissioned to build a 12-meter yacht model for Charley Morgan, designer and owner of "Hentage". America's Cup Contender. He has been deeply involved with large boats since age 16.

Buddy won National East Coast 12-meter R/C Model Yacht Championships in 1972 and 1973.

He was the first winner of "MINI-AM-TERICA'S CUP" in 1974

He returned to the Mini-Cup as a challenger in 1983, after topping 15 U.S. skippers and other foreign challengers. His close race with John Cleave returned the cup to the U.S.

Annually, hundreds of skippers enter their R/C sailboats in dozens of scheduled regattas. Now, R/C sailing enthusiasts can be found throughout the U.S. and Canada. Membership in the AMYA is available to anyone sharing an interest in R/C salling. 

RHODE ISLAND A SUPER STATE



The name of each winner is permanently engraved on the trophy.
